

Appalachia Service Project is excited to share our theme for 2024: **Building Kindness.**

Our theme comes from Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ, God forgave you. (NIV) At ASP we build lots of things-we build new homes, we build relationships, we build community. We build on the foundation of God's love shared with all of us through Christ who modeled a life of service, compassion, and intentional kindness. Stories of kindness are woven through scripture as a way of guiding us in our relationships.

The book of Ephesians is a book about God's love for all people and in this we find instructions on how-to live-in unity with each other as members of the body of Christ. Our theme verse tells us that we are called to live by building kindness with each other. This is an intentional way of life where we give of ourselves in love and compassion to others. We do this with a servant heart, in humility, and we offer kindness with no expectation of receiving anything in return.

This summer we will explore our theme of Building Kindness through stories of Jesus' ministry. Together we will learn how building kindness is foundational to building relationships and that kindness is a way of life as a follower of Christ. Let's consider *Building Kindness* not as a series of random acts but as the potential to become a radical way of living.

Sunflower Cookies (served at Coffee Hour)



Citrus Sugar Cookie dough (from Epicurious): 2 cups unbleached all purpose flour Fluff 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder ¼ teaspoon salt ¾ cup (1 and ½ sticks) unsalted butter, softened ½ cup sugar ¼ cup powdered sugar 1 ¼ teaspoon grated lemon peel 1 ¼ teaspoon grated tangerine or orange peel 1 large egg

To assemble: Marshmallow

Lemon Curd Powdered sugar

Combine flour, baking powder and salt in small bowl. Set aside. In another bowl cream butter and sugars. Beat until light and fluffy. Add grated peels and egg.

Add flour to butter mixture and beat until forms dough. Divide into 3 pieces and flatten into discs. Wrap each in plastic. Refrigerate until firm, about 4 hours. Can be prepared up to 2 days in advance.

To bake. Preheat oven to 350°.

Let dough disc soften. Sprinkle flour on work surface and roll out dough to 1/8 to 1/4" thickness. Cut with flower shaped cookie cutter. Place on baking sheet. Cut out the center of half the flowers (I used a thimble.) Bake 6 -7 minutes. Watch as they brown quickly. Cool on racks.

Sprinkle powdered sugar on top of the center cutout flower cookies.

Spread the uncut cookies with Marshmallow Fluff, then a dab of lemon curd in the center.

Press the center cutout flowers on top so that the lemon curd appears through the hole. Store in the refrigerator. Since these are butter cookies they taste better if they sit a few days. Bon Appetit! Phebe Kirkham

INCIDENTS AND HAPPENINGS OUT OF

OUR PAST <u>CAMP MEETINGS</u>

Methodist camp meetings began in America during the great religious revival of 1799 in Kentucky and Tennessee. Pastors John and William McGee, one a Methodist and one a Presbyterian, held the first camp meeting at Red River. The first meeting was so successful that a second was held at Muddy River and a third at The Ridge. Two Methodist pastors, John Granade and Caleb Taylor, added special camp meeting hymns and spiritual songs to enhance the preaching. Over the next 100 years tens of thousands of souls were converted during these meetings which were held from Maine to Mississippi. In the 1800's, after the end of the Civil War, our church purchased a large Army tent which was used by the members of our congregation. Our people who attended the meetings would travel to the meeting site and stay there for about a week.

In July of 1901 a three-week tent revival was held by our church in the Stratford area. Revivalists Chaplin Roberts of the Bowery Mission in New York City and Reverend J. L. Brooks of Texas held meetings continuously during each of the three weeks. As a result of this revival led by our pastor Reverend Royal Raymond, 50 persons were converted, and 30 persons joined our church.

WHAT IS U.M. ARMY

OUR MISSION HISTORY

U.M. ARMY began in 1979, when thirty-six youth and adults from three Houston churches held the first U.M. ARMY mission week in Athens, TX. Since that time, we have grown to over 30 programs nationally each year. U.M. ARMY has held programs in 17 states to date. Each year we work diligently in our current regions to determine host communities as well as identifying growth areas to begin planting U.M. ARMY to additional regions and communities.

OUR MISSION PROGRAMS

Local churches host our mission programs. Participants eat, sleep, enjoy fellowship and worship in the church. They are divided into work teams of youth. Young adults and adults are leaders and support for the week. U.M. ARMY requires that church groups bring 2 adults for every 5 youth. Preparation, safety and teamwork are priorities for all camp participants.

U.M. ARMY youth and adults work together on construction projects such as porches, stairs and accessibility ramps. Teams also do a variety of home maintenance such as handrails, yard work, painting, windows and doors. Homeowners are referred through local social service agencies and church organizations.
